Latest News... April 1 Changes to Electronic Filing for Involuntary Commitment

North Carolina is currently implementing an electronic filing system called eCourts which will change how involuntary commitment petitions are filed. Starting April 1, 2024, involuntary commitment petitions in counties that have implemented eCourts are mandated to be eFiled. Faxing will no longer be allowed. The following counties have implemented the new process: Beaufort, Camden, Chowan, Currituck, Dare, Gates, Harnett, Hyde, Johnston, Lee, Martin, Mecklenburg, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Tyrrell, Wake, and Washington. The next phase of counties will launch on April 29 (Alamance, Chatham, Durham, Franklin, Granville, Guilford, Orange, Person, Vance, and Warren). You must <u>create a Firm Account to eFile</u> an involuntary commitment petition.
