- 5. Growth of consumerism








Increased Demand

Medicare expansion and Mental Health Parity laws could expand potential patient population by up to 62 million.



Increased Demand (cont'd)

- Increased awareness and rising incidents of mental health issues.
- Diminished stigma.
- Drug and Alcohol rehab industry is estimated at over \$7.7 billion, growing at annual rate of 2 percent*
- Continued growth of community and residential settings.

Increased Demand (cont'd)

Shortage of Psychiatrists

- 1. Increased pay and job opportunities.
- 2. Development of lower-cost solutions.
 - Tele-Psychiatry
 - Nurse Practitioners
 - Primary Care/Behavioral Health Specialists
- 3. Treatment centers and hospitals expanding services into out-patient.

- 73% of nursing home residents and 67% of home health users are female*
