been charged, as my predecessors were, with writing an article for the newsletter. As I pondered this task, I wondered what I could possibly say to my esteemed colleagues that would be of benefit. It led me to take a trip down memory lane: to the time before DSM-5, before CPT code changes, before managed care, MCOs and LMEs, to a time when there were county mental health centers. When there were no such phrases as "evidencebased psychiatry" and "second generation antipsychotics."

There was a time before mental health reform 1.0, 2.0 and 3.0. What's more, these continuous changes have been heaped upon those with mental health, developmental disabilities and substance abuse needs for a generation. And, these changes have been experienced by our profession as well.

Surely everyone is a bit tired at this point. I am not saying that change is a bad thing; in fact, I believe a system that cannot critically assess itself and make meaningful change will ultimately not evolve and improve. With this historical context in mind, I questioned what could I possibly say that is relevant? And then it hit me—we need a pep talk.

I am the mother of two young adults who are part of the digital generation, so YouTube is a frequent reference in our house. For those of you who have not seen the Kid President video where a 9-year-old "president" delivers a pep talk, you should take few minutes to watch it. It is truly inspirational. I cannot

> So here goes... are you ready? Because this is simple:

> People, we are the Psychiatrists of the State of North Carolina. We have a purpose and a charge that no one other than our profession can fulfill. We are not playing dress-up as doctors. We are doctors. More importantly, we are the mental health experts who must speak to uphold the clinical integrity of mental health treatment in the State of North Carolina. We do not lower the bar. We inform where the bar rests and work to keep it there.

> Why? Because of the oath we took when we completed medical school. Because we are in a unique position to promote access to quality care and to ensure a sufficient workforce across the state. We have an important and necessary role to play and need to maintain our place at the table. It is from where we sit and present—our stance that we can best serve our mission as an organization. And best serve the people of our state.

> But we need the energy and the resolve. So we are going to gather shoulder-to-shoulder, and link arms and stand tall. In our private practices, teaching hospitals, clinics, agencies, MCOs and inpatient facilities we are going to look in the mirror and at each other and say "We've got this." We are not going to ask permission for the things we were trained to do. We are going to

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Update on the Public Policy Front *Robin B. Huffman, Executive Director*

The Senate unveiled its budget bill on a Sunday night and passed it through committees and the full Senate by Wednesday. That kind of speed means several things: 1) details in this article will be obsolete by the time you read this; 2) careful, thoughtful deliberations are the exception, not the rule; 3) we need to act swiftly when a concern rises; and 4) it is true what they say about legislation and making sausage.

Priority Issues for NCPA

Tax Reform: The idea of taxing services of physicians, lawyers, auto mechanics and others in the service industry is not new to our state, but the strong interest in finding new revenue puts this concept in play. As I type this article, my computer is streaming audio of the House Finance discussion of its "Simplify Adjustment to Federal Taxable Income" bill.

Tenor of the Chambers

If you've read the newspapers you already know that, in addition to the work at hand, leaders of both chambers appear to be readying to run against each other for the US Senate seat currently held by Kay Hagan (D). This seems to be complicating the already interesting dynamics of a relatively new and inexperienced legislative body, diminished roles for those previously in leadership positions, and diverse ideological leanings from the party in power. Add to that the competing interests of holding down costs (complicated by the increasing Medicaid budget) and lowering taxes.

As one state Senator said to me vesterday, "So where are we going to find 1.3 billion dollars?" Those advocating in the legislative buildings recognize that we need to do a great deal of education and that we cannot assume anything based on a legislator's party affiliation. As one of psychiatry's lobbyists, it feels to me like being a high school student entering a new school and having to reorient to new people, new procedures, new cliques, and new rules!

The dueling tax plans all propose lowering individual income tax rates and eliminating the state's estate taxes. Corporate income tax rates would also drop in both current plans. At this moment, the House does not include physician services in its sales tax plan. The Senate has just released its bill, which includes a 5 percent tax on all healthcare and medical services. We will try to keep members apprised through our electronic newsletters and alerts and welcome any news you are hearing from your accounts!

Items in the Proposed Budget (as of press time): Embedded in the 414-page Senate Budget (SB402) are a number of provisions. NCPA will be working to oppose these provisions to have them removed from the House and then the final budget; some of these items we support. Among the provisions of interest to our members:

Closure of the three state Alcohol and Drug Abuse Treatment Centers (ADATCs). Some \$30+ million would be "saved" by these closures (effective September 1, 2013), with only about a third of the savings going to pay for community-based services the legislators think will take their place. (We hope this plan will have been reversed by the time you read this.)

- There is a \$15 million cut to LME/MCO administration.
- Closure of the Wright School: savings of \$2.7 million for this 24-bed residential facility for complexly ill children.
- \$9 million in previously allocated funds have been released for use to expand the number of "three-way contract" beds, additional payment for patients treated in local community psychiatric units.



- \$2milliontoestablishastatewide telepsychiatry program to help reduce wait times in hospital emergency departments. NCPA members have been involved in developing this plan.
- Almost \$2 million for funds put in the budget to implement the N.C. Child Treatment Program statewide.

The Senate budget also has special provisions of interest:
